

Mount Tarcoola Primary School 2012 Annual Report

SCHOOL DETAILS

School Enrolment Profile

The 2012 student Census data had a total for Semester 2 of 638 students. This consisted of 499 Primary and 139 Pre –Primary and Kindergarten students.

In 2012 the students were housed in 19 Primary classes, 3 Pre-Primary classes and 2 groups of Kindergarten students attending two and a half day a week.

Teaching Staff

In addition to the full time teaching allocation the school also utilised Literacy and Numeracy National Partnerships funding to increase the FTE to 34, with the actual number of teachers on site greater as some staff work part time.

The teaching staff are in the majority experienced with the vast majority having taught for over 10 years and the average length of service at Mount Tarcoola is over 15 years. The school has a very stable staff with the only transfer being staff into the school. All teaching staff meet the professional requirements to teach in Western Australia and all have current registration with the relevant boards.

The majority of staff hold permanency with the Department of Education, and the fixed term positions are due to staff on leave or staff increasing their permanent work fraction.

The school is a Level 5 Primary so the administration team is a Principal and two Deputies who provide educational leadership along with administration of the school according to Departmental policies and guidelines.

Non-teaching Staff

The non-teaching staff play an important role within the school either directly in the classrooms supporting students or contributing to the overall smooth running of the school.

As with the teaching staff, the non-teaching staff are stable and increase in staffing has been due to students enrolments. The roles performed by non-teaching staff include; Registrar, School Officers, Library Officers, Kindergarten and Pre-Primary Education Assistants, Junior Primary Education Assistants, Special Needs Education Assistants, Aboriginal and Islander Education Officer, Gardener/Handyperson, Cleaners and a Bus Warden as some student who travel on a bus arrive just after 8am and depart at 3.45pm.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

There are many events throughout the year, in additional to the excursions/incursions, athletics carnivals, swimming lessons and assemblies, that provide opportunities to extend the education of students and in 2012 some of these were;

Numero; the students in 2012 followed up the 2011 appearance at the state finals by again travelling to Perth after being successful in the regional finals. Numero has a strong following by the students at Mount Tarcoola. In addition to the Numero competition students are often recognised through the competitions conducted via the ED Magazine in the West Australian newspaper.

Promoting Good Health; in addition to the promoting of healthy lifestyles and eating through classroom activities and the canteen, students are also involved in Walking Club in term 2 each year. This is when students walk laps of the oval before school and then share a healthy snack.

The annual Lap-A-Thon whilst raising money for the P and C is another way that good health is promoted to the students, with students encouraged to prepare for the Lap-A-Thon and then to continue the activity in the weeks and months following.

Students also participate in sport outside of school hours under the Mount Tarcoola name and parents and staff assist with coordinating these teams.

Local Academic Competitions; Mount Tarcoola students participate in the Randolph Stow Young Writers' Awards and the Clem Burns Heritage Awards. In both these success was again achieved by the students with the highlight being one students winning the Overall Prize in the Clem Burns heritage Awards.

Gateway; students from Mount Tarcoola join with other students from the Geraldton Region in an extension program conducted offsite called GATEWAY which is a Primary Extension course.

Music; The school has a choir who perform at the Geraldton School's Showcase each year, at community events and also at Aged Care facilities in Geraldton. Instrumental music is also conducted at the school. Students who are selected to participate in brass or woodwind receive tuition from specialist teachers employed through the School of Instrumental Music.

Year 7 Challenge Day; this initiative provides incentives for the Year 7 students to stay focussed on their learning in their final year of Primary schooling. The students are offered a challenge day after earning a set number of point by the end of each term. The students are then invited to attend various activities at the PCYC, Aquarena, Dongara Archery Park and Geraldton Camp School.

Indonesian school; Mount Tarcoola Primary has developed a Memorandum of Agreement with Sekolah Dasar Negeri 4 Wates school in Yogyakarta. Students have visited the school and staff have conducted demonstration lessons for the at school staff in Yogyakarta. Teaching staff have travelled from Indonesia to Mount Tarcoola to improve their teaching skills and to further develop their conversational English levels as part of the exchange of knowledge.

Buddy Classes; across the school classes combine to do activities with each other and to broaden the friendship of students beyond their particular age group or class. Buddy classes also combine to present at parent assemblies.

PARENT PARTICPATION

Parents are always welcomed into the school and there are numerous parent volunteers that assist across the school from Kindergarten to Year 7. Parents are also regular attendees at not only class assemblies but also special assemblies such as NAIDOC, Harmony Day, ANZAC, Remembrance and Bookweek.

In addition to assemblies there is also an Open Day when parents came and visit classrooms and a Welcome BBQ which is supported by the P and C when families come into school after hours to socialise and meet each other and staff in an informal setting. The Welcome BBQ is a KidsMatter initiative.

The P and C are very supportive of the school and after fundraising to air-conditioning all the classrooms over the last few years, are now focussed on raising funds for Interactive Whiteboards for classrooms, which has commenced this year and will carry into 2013/14.

The Kindergarten Pre-Primary also have a P and C committee and they have raised funds for projects specific to the Kindergarten Pre-Primary area with their main goal the further development of the Natural Playground.

FEATURES OF THE LEARNING PROGRAM

Due the numbers of students the school operated with both straight year group classes and mixed year groups.

The staff were working towards the implementation of the Australian Curriculum during 2012 with the goal of implementation in 2013.

Besides the classroom learning covering the learning areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Health, Society and Environment, The Arts, Design and Technology, the students are engaged with specialist teachers in the areas of Indonesian LOTE, Physical Education, ICT, and Library.

The students have access to ICT throughout the school with computers ratios above those set by the Department of Education. The school in 2013 plans to move towards increasing the mobility of the ICT network with Laptops to replace Desktops and also the introduction of iPads into the school.

ATTENDANCE

From the details below it can be see that the attendance rates of students are equal to state percentages. There has been a slight decrease since 2010 in regards to overall percentages and that is being addressed through increased parental contact and awareness.



STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

The NAPLAN results have been the source of information utilised to report on student achievement in Years 3, 5 and 7. Students are tested in the areas of English and Numeracy with a summary chart below covering the grades and the years 2010 through to 2012.

From the data it can be seen that Mount Tarcoola has, in the majority, been operating in the 'Expected' zone, with the exception of some Year 7 results. The move back into the 'Expected' zone in 2012 for the Year 7's is due to the efforts of the staff and students not only in Year 7, but across the school and this was partly assisted by the Literacy and Numeracy National Partnerships which provided access to Professional learning related to data analysis and planning across all years of schooling.

The planning for 2013 has involved setting English and Numeracy targets for the year groups aiming to increase the number of students achieving in the top 20% of the state

in the various NAPLAN assessments. This would result in Mount Tarcoola achieving at the higher end when compared to 'Like Schools' from across Australia.

Students are also assessed via another standardised assessment tool called WAMSE and that identifies skills in Society and Environment and Science. Below is the summary of data.

Again the data shows that the students in Year 5 and 7 are performing at an expected level and above expected in 2012 for the Year 7 cohort in Society and Environment.

As mentioned above there is a focus on English and Numeracy improvement and in addition to that there is also a continuing focus on ICT and also Student Health and Wellbeing, highlighted by the KidsMatter initiative and also the Positive Behaviour Schools model that is being implemented across the school.
